The Privilege of Trailblazing Workshop Australian National University, 28th March 2025

This workshop aims to critically investigate the figure of the trailblazing woman. We invite papers that investigate trailblazing women in a variety of fields of endeavour and historical time periods in Australia. We particularly welcome papers addressing questions such as: What has enabled trailblazing over time? In what ways other than gender were women trailblazers connected? What are the links between privilege, power, and trailblazing? To what extent did these women use their positions to make change for future generations? Why are we interested in these figures? And what are we trying to achieve in telling their stories in 2025? We encourage papers that provide comparative perspectives from other settings, particularly New Zealand and the Pacific, or that arise from disciplinary backgrounds other than history, such as biography, law, Pacific studies, or Indigenous studies.

The theme of the Symposium addresses the many and diverse cultural exchanges between France and Australia that have shaped both nations over centuries of migration, artistic collaborations and intellectual cross-pollination. This rich history of interaction has not only influenced the cultural landscapes of both nations but has also contributed to a deeper understanding of each other's societies. Building on the historical and conceptual frameworks and the diverse case studies presented in these works, this Symposium invites papers that further explore areas where French influence has been felt in Australia. Additionally, we encourage contributions that shift the focus to examine the sometimes overlooked presence of Australia in French society and culture.

15th Annual Australian International Political Economy Network (AIPEN) Workshop Adelaide University / Flinders University

February 6th - 7th 2025

The world economy is increasingly challenged by wicked problems and acute questions produced by overlaps and tensions between security, knowledge, finance and production. These include: what security/investment trade-offs should be made to secure access to critical materials and protect critical infrastructure? How much data surveillance are we willing to give to the market in exchange for better knowledge and security? What is the most politically viable path to a renewable energy strategy? How are changes in global value and wealth chain management transforming the treatment of labour and environmental resources? How are trends toward derisking and the rise of private finance transforming inclusive growth? How will climate breakdown force a revaluation of assets? AIPEN 2025 is looking for answers to these and similar questions and invites papers on the above themes or any issues related to change in the international political economy.
