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1. Introduction

Economics was a founding discipline of the University and has seen a large number of changes in School and Faculty structures. It is an indication of the resilience of the discipline and its strong intellectual and policy core that Economics has thrived for over 100 hundred years and remains a leading department in Australia with a great international reputation.

In 2016 Economics faced another challenge, as one of the 4 Discipline of the Business School, with the amalgamation of university Faculties. Next year Economics will be part of a large faculty of Arts Business, Law and Education and I am sure as it has in the past the Economics scholarly research and dedicated teaching will shine through as a centre of academic rigor and excellence in the University, but also grounded in policy and real-world issues that contribute to improving the welfare of societies.

As always the seminar programme has been the key focal point for academic life and 2016 was no exception in offering a very strong line up of national and international visitors. Another great outcome was the appointment of three outstanding academics as Adjunct Professors: Prof Rachel Murphy, Oxford, Professor Billy Jack, Georgetown and Professor Xiabo Zhang. 

4. The Shann Memorial Lecture

The annual Shann Memorial Lecture is held in memory of the Foundation Professor of Economics at the University of Western Australia, Edward Owen Giblin Shann. Edward Shann has been regarded as the pioneer of the academic development of economics and traditional Australian economic history and he was a strong advocate of individual intellectual freedom and developing a sense of social responsibilities. He penned several books and essays on the economic history of Australia and was a major influence in formulating financial and fiscal policies in Australia. Edward Shann was born in 1884 and graduated with first-class honours in history and political economics from Queens' College, University of Melbourne. He won several scholarships and went on for higher studies at the London School of Economics. He returned to Australia from England in 1910 and was lecturer-in-charge of history and economics at the University of Queensland from June 1911 to December 1912. He joined the University of Western Australia in its inaugural year of 1913 as the Foundation Professor of history and economics. He then went on to work at the University for a total of 22 years and was Vice-Chancellor from 1921 to 1923. Edward Shann's life was cut tragically short when he died at the age of 51, in 1935.

The Shann Memorial Lecture is organised jointly by the UWA Business School and the West Australian Branch of the

Economic Society of Australia and is widely regarded as a premier public economics lecture in Australia.

It has earned an enviable reputation for a high standard of scholarship and it has made a substantial contribution to economic debate in Australia.

The 55th Shann Memorial Lecture was delivered at the UWA Business School on 27th April 2016 by Professor Mary S. Morgan. Mary S. Morgan is Professor of History and Philosophy of Economics at the London School of Economics and Vice President (Publications) at the British Academy. She also holds a professorial appointment at the University of Amsterdam and is a visiting fellow at the University of Pennsylvania. Mary's major area of scholarship is the history of economic and econometric ideas. Her recent award winning book, *The World in the Model* (Cambridge University Press, 2012), considers modelling as a method of enquiry, the imagining and imaging of economic ideas (to consider the way that images emerge and are developed over time to give form, and greater clarity, to economic thinking), model experiments, the uses of simulations and a range of other issues.

This Shann Memorial Lecture is presented as part of the Economic Society of Australia's 2016 Eminent Speaker Series.

5. PhD Conference in Economics and Business

The PhD Conference in Economics and Business is an annual event that brings together students and academics from most Australian universities, as well as some overseas institutions. It was first initiated in 1987 by the Business School of the University of Western Australia. The conference is currently co-organised by the Australian National University, Monash University, University of Queensland and University of Western Australia. The location of the conference has alternated between these four universities.

The basic objective of the conference is to help with the training of promising doctoral students by giving them the opportunity to gain feedback on and exposure for their research. It also enables PhD students to meet with their peers and to make contact with senior academics and researchers with similar interests, as well as acting as an informal job market whereby students can demonstrate their abilities and attract attention to their prospects.

The format of the conference has remained true to the original concept whereby each student is assigned a discussant to comment on their research paper. The discussants, who are specially chosen to match the subject matter of the papers, include an impressive list of senior researchers with extensive experience in supervision. This highlights an important feature of the conference which is the outstanding quality of the feedback given to the students by the discussants and other participants. Additionally, the conference is a productive combination of research in both economics and finance, something that is rare in Australia.

The 29th PhD Conference was held at the UWA Business School in November 2016 (http://www.business.uwa.edu.au/_data/assets/pdf_file/0010/2938177/UWA-phd-conf-program-171016.pdf) and involved 32 students from a number of Australian and NZ universities and 32 discussants. The conference was opened by Robyn Owens, Deputy Vice-Chancellor (Research) at UWA. A number of extremely interesting papers were presented, and it was clear from the quality of the students and discussants that the future of research in economics and finance is indeed exciting.

Four prizes were determined by a secret ballot of all participants and the winners were:

- Best Presenters - David Delacrétaz, University of Melbourne (Economics) and Emma Zhang, University of New South Wales (Finance)
- Best Discussants, - Paul Frijters, University of Queensland (Economics) and Terry Walter, University of Sydney, and Mardi Dungey, University of Tasmania (Finance)

Two special prizes were awarded to the student with the most potential, chosen by Martin Richardson (ANU) and Izan (University of Western Australia). The winners were:

- Student with Most Potential, Economics -- David Delacrétaz, University of Melbourne
- Student with Most Potential, Finance -- Jianlei Han, University of Queensland

The 30th Conference will be held at the University of Melbourne in 2017.

6. Visitors

The Economics Discipline was pleased to welcome several official visitors during 2016. During their visits, they presented seminars and collaborated with members of the Discipline on research. Guests included:

Professor Axel Dreher visited UWA for 2 weeks in early October, both to work on a research project with Michael Jetter, and to give a seminar presentation about Chinese foreign aid in Africa. A number of colleagues exchanged quite a few research ideas with Axel and his only complaint was the disappointing weather performance (rightfully so). We are hoping he'll give the Perth climate another chance at some point in the future.

Professor Xiuyan Liu is Associate Professor and Head of Economics in the School of Economics and Management, Southeast University in China. His research areas include Economic Geography, Urban Economics and the Chinese Economy. His work appeared in major economics journals in China. Dr Liu visited UWA Economics during August-October and conducted collaborative research with Professor Yanrui Wu. He also held informal meetings with several economics PhD candidates who are writing their theses on Chinese economic development.

Professor Bettina Klaus is a Full Professor at the Department of Economics of the University of Lausanne, in Switzerland. She is a renowned economist with valuable contributions to the advancements of Market Design and Game Theory. Her list of publications is extensive and impressive, with a vast number of co-authors from

different fields. Her work has greatly contributed to advances in matching theory, which is applied to a diverse range of problems like house allocation, students' placement and roommates matching. During her visit to UWA from October 2nd to October 17th 2017 Professor Klaus offered a mini course on Market Design and gave a talk at the Economics Research seminar.

Dr Siew Ling Yew is a senior lecturer of the department of Economics at Monash University. Her research areas include Macroeconomics, Public Finance, Economic Growth and Development, and Population Economics. She has published articles in international journals, including Journal of Public Economics, Journal of Economic Dynamics and Control, Canadian Journal of Economics, Economic Record, Economic Modelling and Empirical Economics. During his visit to UWA from November 14th to November 20th 2016, Dr Yew collaborated with Dr Bei Li on a joint project to investigate the welfare effect of the social security policy reform in developing countries.

Professor David Stadelmann is the Chair of Development Economics at the University of Bayreuth (Germany). He visited UWA for 2 weeks in September. During his stay, David gave a presentation about how interest groups affect politicians' behaviour and he very much enjoyed his time here. His stay at UWA was productive, as he finished 2 joint papers with Michael Jetter, in addition to getting new research projects on the way.
