Explore the concept of digital advocacy, one of the most powerful approaches used by civil society, governmental institutions, political movements and non-government organisations (NGOs) to galvanize support for influencing change.

#### **Description:**

Digital advocacy engages with contemporary issues of power, inequality, and injustice, offering strategies for social and political change to shape new ethical terrain for our public cultures and social worlds. Explore how digital technologies play an essential role in mobilizing people around various issues and causes, opening unprecedented opportunities to advocate on a range of concerns such as social justice, public health and environmentalism, science and technology, and international development.

#### **Learning outcomes:**

In this unit, you will:

- learn about key theories of advocacy and social change;
- practice developing digital advocacy media such as videos or social media campaigns; and
- critically engage with the link between the theory and practice of social change.

**Dr Katarina Damjanov** has an extensive professional background in creative and media industries, and applies her expertise in practice-oriented teaching in the fields of digital media and communication design.
