In this fascinating and engaging unit, you will develop your awareness of citizenship as both 'active' and 'global', and discuss the need for civic participation and responsibility in an increasingly complex and diverse world.

Description:

This unit approaches citizenship against a cross-cultural history of the concept. Through a series of field trips and incursions, it explores local and global possibilities for the exercise of citizenship, and it invites and supports students to explore and develop their own pathways to active citizenship. Classes will focus on global and culturally diverse contexts, through online participation in a global citizenship network with students at other universities - particularly the Matariki Network - and potentially also with McCusker Centre partners such as Global Citizen in New York.

Learning outcomes:

In this unit, you will:

- explore the concept of citizenship, including its historical and cultural meanings and emergent possibilities;
- identify preferred pathways by which responsibilities as a citizen may be pursued;
- practise self-awareness, receptive listening, meaningful connection with others, and humble collaboration; and
- identify and engage with key local, national and/or global organisations that support active citizenship.

Chantal Bourgault du Coudray is the Academic Coordinator of the McCusker Centre for Citizenship at UWA, and also teaches gender and cultural studies. She has extensive experience leading place-based and transdisciplinary collaborations between university students and community partners, with a focus on fostering diversity and inclusion through respectful dialogue, 'eloquent listening', and relational work. Her recent publications focus on feminist care ethics, relationality and communication across difference, and a collaborative project on the community engagement process for a place-based interdisciplinary Australian Research Council project, entitled 'Locating Loss Through Climate Change'.
